Theme

The 2006 ISoCaRP Congress will explore the contemporary challenges and emerging opportunities that cities are facing vis-à-vis influential forces that can be summarised as integrative and disintegrative. This year's framework builds on themes examined in previous ISoCaRP congresses, such as globalisation and its influence on planning (2003), the management of the city region (2004) and the spaces produced by and required for the "creative economy" (2005). By integrative forces we refer to, inter alia, strategies formulated by urban stakeholders to position their cities in the global arena, including institutional actions undertaken via growth-friendly policy and market initiatives realised through mega projects. These set of efforts aiming for urban competitiveness have nevertheless revealed the other side of the coin –how cities have become exposed to tides of disintegrative forces, which, scholars assert, has caused urban systems to be drawn to spatial, cultural, social and economic fragmentation.

The interplay of this framework, at remarkable magnitudes of scale and speed, has perhaps uncovered a gap between the planner and the doer. Is planning a hurdle for economic growth based on real estate industries? Is rapid urban development just non-sustainable land speculation? Observers of the current status of our cities might conclude that there could be some truth in both questions. It is a fact that construction and property industries are pillars to the world economy and is also undeniable that cities in both the developed and developing world are exposed to escalating pressures, as we have witnessed in the social unrest occurred in December of 2005 in the heart of Europe.

Starting point

Hosted in a city that embodies diversity and mixture both geographically and culturally, the Istanbul dialogue hopes to address the Congress' framework through hands-on narratives and practical examples. Authors are encouraged to present case studies that report on how seemingly conflictive integrative and disintegrative forces affect the shape of our cities at socio-economical, institutional and cultural levels. Contributions are expected to expose how planning can go beyond a regulatory duty to play a indispensable role in preparing urban strategies; detect how plans can assimilate multidisciplinary thinking and participatory schemes so that they mean more than colourful drawings with modest implementation potential; suggest how planning could balance the immediacy of development as dictated by the market and a sustainable framework with a broader horizon; and propose methods to synchronise planning and production of cities. Views from varied urban stakeholders are particularly welcomed.



Parallel Sessions

The Congress will consist of four parallel sessions addressing a particular set of issues:

Parallel Session 1: Socio-economic implications

Papers presented in this Session will focus on the effects of integration and disintegration forces in urban socio-economic issues, such as:

- What are the main causes of socio-economic polarisation and which remedies have been successfully applied?
- Can the effect of the neo-liberal agenda on urban structures be mapped?
- Can planning have a say in market-driven urban development?
- How can the plan reconcile equity, social cohesion and quality of life with the dynamics brought by globalisation?
- How are regional differences mirrored in urban disintegration?
- Which strategies have succeeded in being economically and socially sustainable?
- Do urban regeneration projects bring about gentrification?

Parallel Session 2: Institutional implications

Submissions to this Session will touch upon issues pertinent to governance and urban development agents, and in particular how instruments drafted to guide urban development are affected by, or can influence integration and disintegration forces. Topics to be dissected contain the following:

- Examples of initiatives undertaken by local governments to respond to external forces.
- Examples of exportable best practices in governance and urban management.
- Examples of multi-stakeholder urban strategies, devised in cooperation of local governments, public development agencies, planning bodies, economic councils, public-private partnerships, real estate developers, and community pressure groups amongst others.
- Which institutions have been created to better address contemporary challenges at local level?
- Implications of the progressive privatisation of urban development: case studies.
- How can the planner add value to urban agents thus minimising disjoint between thinking and acting?
- How can the administration normalise without putting a corset on urban entrepreneurialism?
- Examples of participatory schemes at vision, development and implementation stages.

**Parallel Session 3:
Cultural implications**

In this Session, papers are expected to discuss the dilemmas of retaining a cultural identity and a territorial legacy versus the demands put forward by the competitive global city. Forces of integration and disintegration frequently put to a test the linkage between the vernacular and the spaces of economic progress. Issues to be discussed include:

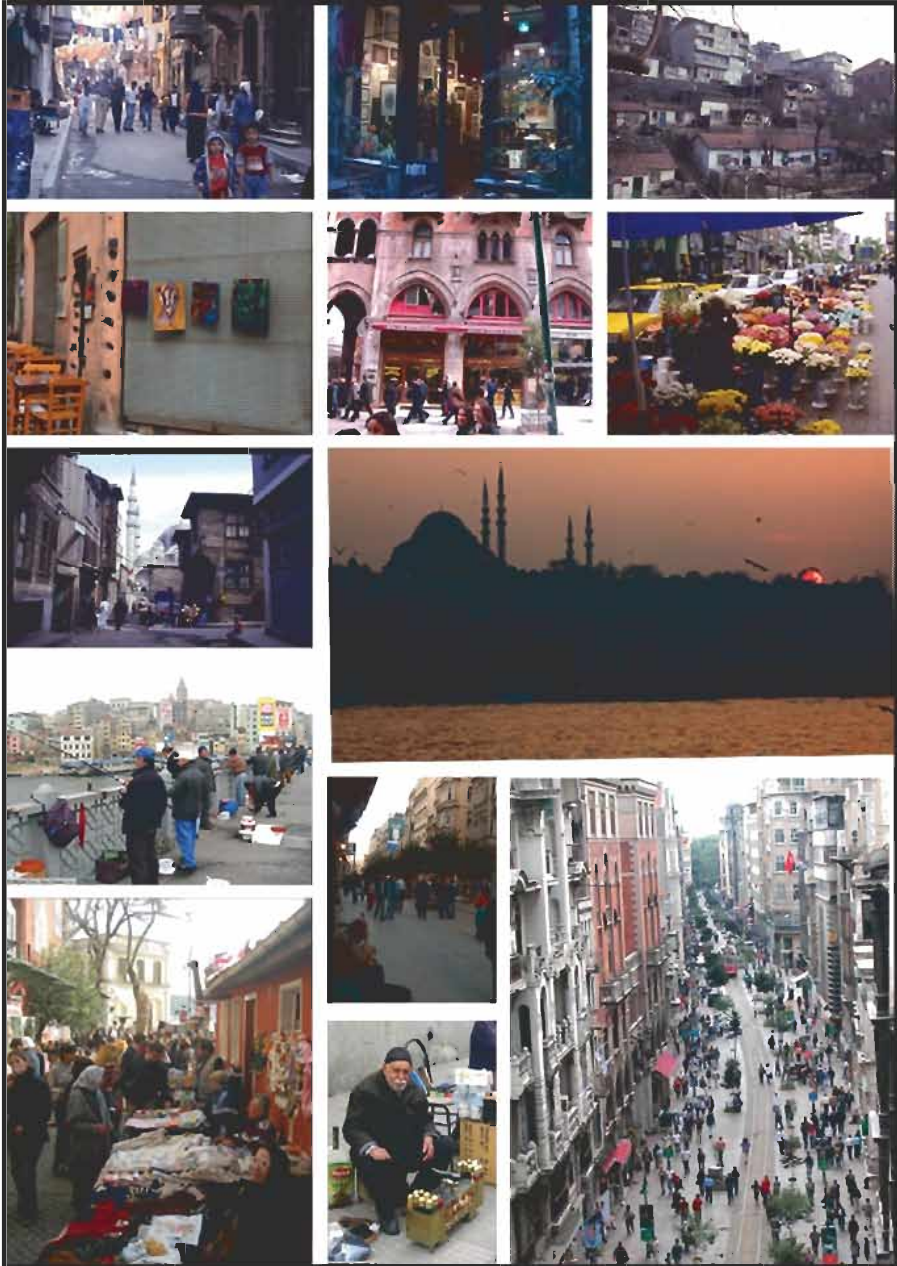
- Examples of plans that incorporate identity as a key factor –through safeguarding heritage or “inventing” it.
- Examples of plans that do not take into account identity as a factor – can these cities remain competitive after erasing built memory?
- How can planners contribute to reconcile the seemingly opposing natures of the “cut and paste city” and the genius loci?
- Has city making become a commoditised routine that replicates the iconic and perhaps cosmetic side of architecture?
- Do cities engaged in standardised regeneration schemes loose their distinctiveness?

**Parallel Session 4:
Market Perspectives - Cross-Sectoral Views on Integration and Disintegration**

This Session is conceived as an Open Platform in which participants shall discuss the status quo of the planning profession, wherever acting as scholar, official or practitioner, and the relationship with other urban stakeholders. Contributions to this Session are asked to investigate if and demonstrate how the inclusive, multi-disciplinary plan is a possible antidote to the socio-economic fragmentation of our cities. Special interest will be cast upon implemented projects that have re-shaped cities and the assessment of how they have contributed (or not) to create a better, economically sound and cohesive city.

**Parallel Session 5:
Theory of Planning in Integration and Disintegration**

This Session amalgamates theoretical initiatives on the city, its assets and instruments, which could be put in place to help urban areas to cope with forces of integration and disintegration. Topics include regeneration policies, participatory planning for diversity and social cohesion, city attractiveness, marketing and promotion, tourism, and other instances of integrative planning towards sustainability.

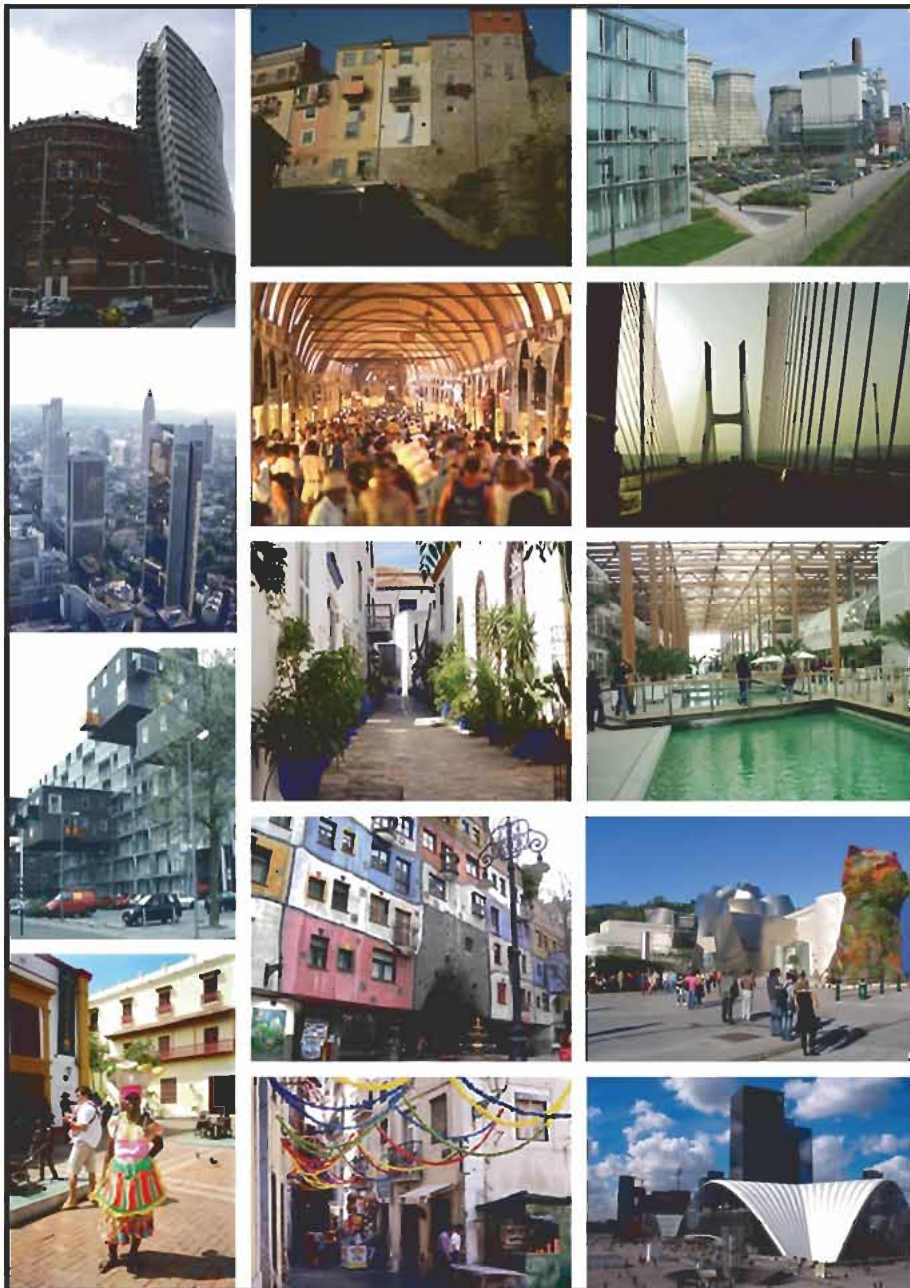

WORKSHOP****Connecting Cities, Connecting Istanbul**

Istanbul is a unique city in many ways: It is an ancient port-city where water acts as a dividing as well as a connecting element; connecting not only different parts of the city but also two continents: Europe and Asia. At the cross-road of civilizations, the city has always been a unique melting pot of a variety of cultures. For many centuries, Istanbul enjoyed the status of being the capital city of three world Empires each of which endowed it with many monuments. Its poetic skyline dotted with domes and slender minarets, the Grand Bazaar, the Golden Horn and the Bosphorus surrounded with gently rolling hills are the most renowned features of Istanbul.

But contemporary Istanbul is much more than all these well known layers of history and natural features. It is a city of many faces, diverse in people and places. It is the heart and mind of a large industrial region where national and multinational production, and capital for that matter, is concentrated. It is the economic engine of modern Turkey. With its young and highly qualified labour the city is for sure an incubator of creativity. No wonder why Newsweek at its front cover has recently named the city as "Cool Istanbul" and addressed it as "Europe's hippest city." It is a thriving city of arts and culture and has recently won the bid for European Capital of Culture for 2010.

Istanbul is a city with global aspirations. Efforts to re-profile the city and integrate it with world markets since the last two decades resulted in the emergence of a new skyline of shimmering skyscrapers marking the new business district. Deluxe hotels, luxury homes, renovated historic districts and numerous shopping centres are among other elements that make-up the new face of Istanbul. Increasingly, the city is becoming a glittering star in the international property markets. Part and parcel of these global aspirations is the development of certain strategic locations through recently held international competitions, where famous professionals such as Zaha Hadid, Massimiliano Fuksas, Kisho Kurokawa, Kengo Kuma, Ken Yeang, and Winy Maas-led MVRDV group were the competitors.

Istanbul is a challenging city for those who govern it, for those who plan it, for those who build and re-build and for all those who live in it. And the picture is not always as bright as described above. There is also the other side of the coin with a rather grim picture. In this picture there are the illegally built squatter settlements with low urban quality, poverty stricken neighbourhoods and immense pressures put, by the rich and poor alike, upon the life sources of the city.

Istanbul is going through a special moment in its history of planning. For over a year, intense planning studies are carried out in the newly founded Istanbul Metropolitan Planning and Urban Design Centre (IMP). Here, the planners of Istanbul are striving to tackle many of these challenges: protecting historic heritage and natural resources in the face of rapidly increasing population, increasing the quality of housing and urban living, renewal of disaster-prone building stock, balancing urban development along the long stretch of the metropolitan area on the European and Anatolian sides, creating a poly-centric metropolitan structure and promoting sectors that will give Istanbul a more competitive edge in the international arena.

Participants in this Workshop will have the opportunity to experience this vibrant and dynamic city. Through site visits they will be introduced to many facets of Istanbul including the historic centre, new business district, rich and the poor neighbourhoods and will have a chance to understand first hand the tensions, dilemmas, aspirations and the tremendous urban potentials of this special city at the margins of Europe. A special session will be arranged for the exchange of ideas and experiences between the ISoCaRP members and the planners of Istanbul who are facing the challenge of connecting Istanbul, not only to the world system of cities; but also of socially and spatially integrating the diverse and fragmented parts of the city.

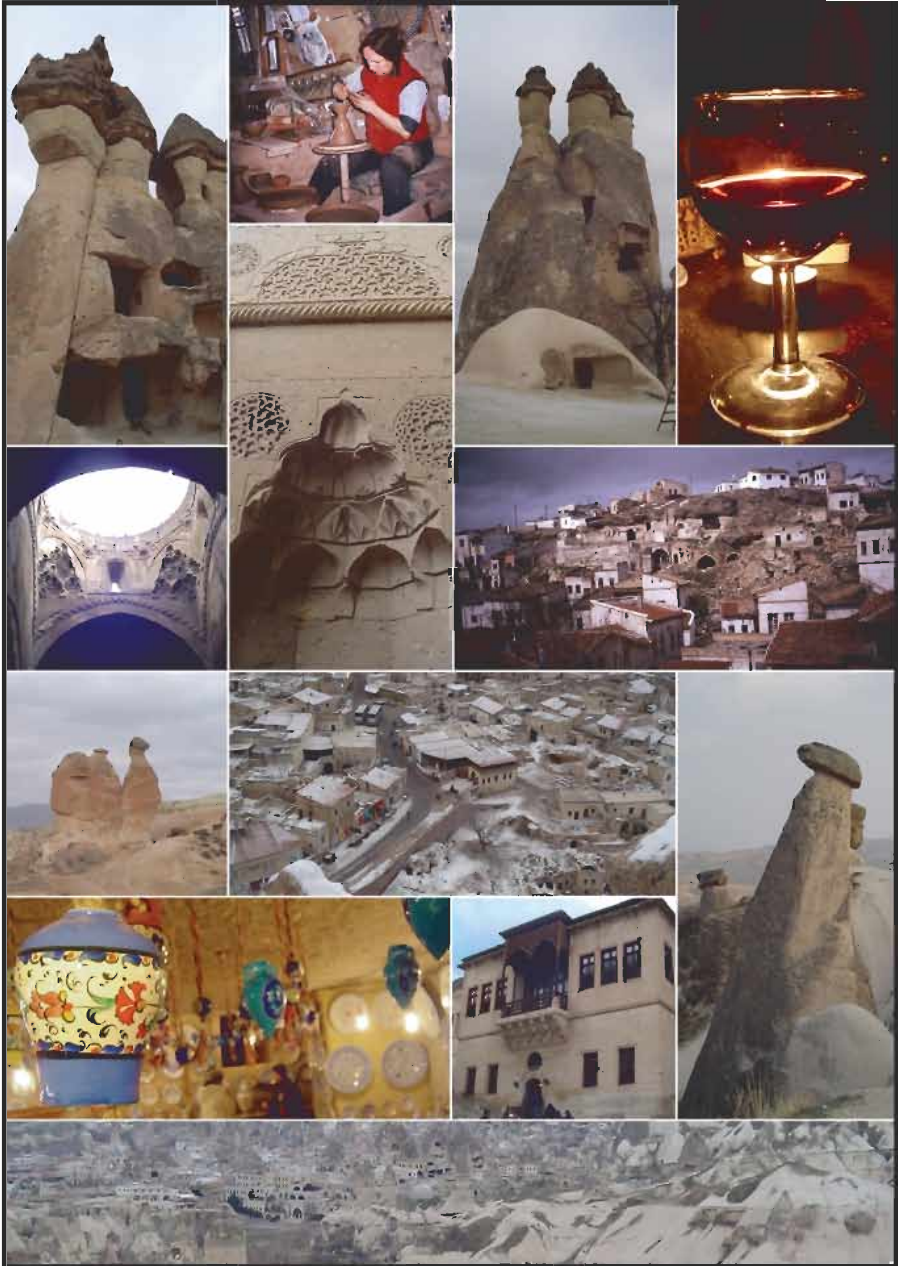

General Information

Routledge Prize

Routledge Publishers (UK) have made available to ISOCaRP a prize of €400. The Routledge Prize (former Carfax Prize) will be awarded to the best Young Planning Professional's Poster in relation to the Congress Theme. The Award Ceremony takes place at the end of the Closing Session of the Congress.

Getting to Istanbul

The major Istanbul Airport is Atatürk International Airport is located 23 km west of the city centre. There are regular scheduled flights to all major European capitals and major cities in Turkey.

Airport Transport

There are regular shuttle buses, called HAVAS, from Istanbul's Atatürk Airport to Taksim, the cultural and commercial centre of the city. The HAVAS shuttles run every half hour between 06:00 a.m. and 01:00 p.m. It takes about 40 minutes and costs 8.40 YTL (around €4), and 25 % more after midnight.

Compared to Europe, taxis are cheaper in Istanbul. A taxi from the Airport to the city centre costs about €15 during the day, 50% more in the middle of the night. It takes between 25 and 60 minutes for the trip, depending upon traffic. (Note that cost increases according to the time spent in traffic).

Moving Around

None of the hotels are in the neighbourhoods of the Congress Venues. The cheapest transport for moving around are the hop on / hop off minibuses called "Dolmuş".

Upon arrival, participants will receive further details as the Dolmuş routes and prices (around €1,00 per route); a taxi ride from Taksim area to the venues costs approximately €5.00 per ride and can be shared with 4 persons.

Climate

September is one of the best times to visit Istanbul, with its mild climate where daytime heights are usually changing from around 16°C to 25°C (61°F to 77°F), and lows from around 9°C to 18°C (48°F to 64°F) and with the lowest humidity (under 30%) within the year. The mean number of rainy days is 6.1 for September.

Clothing

Take light, cotton summer clothing and cardigans for the evening.

Visa Requirements

All interested participants from outside the EU should immediately inquire about the visa procedures at their nearest Turkish Embassy or Consulate, as these vary from country to country, please have a look at: www.mfa.gov.tr/MFA/ConsularInformation/

If a visa is required, requests for an official invitation to the Congress have to be submitted to the ISOCaRP Secretariat.

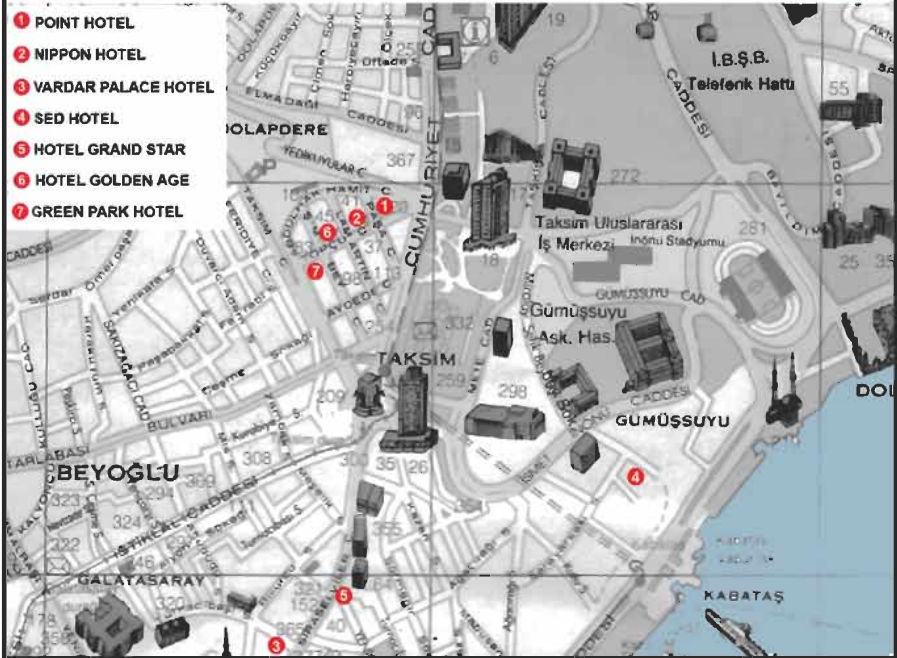
